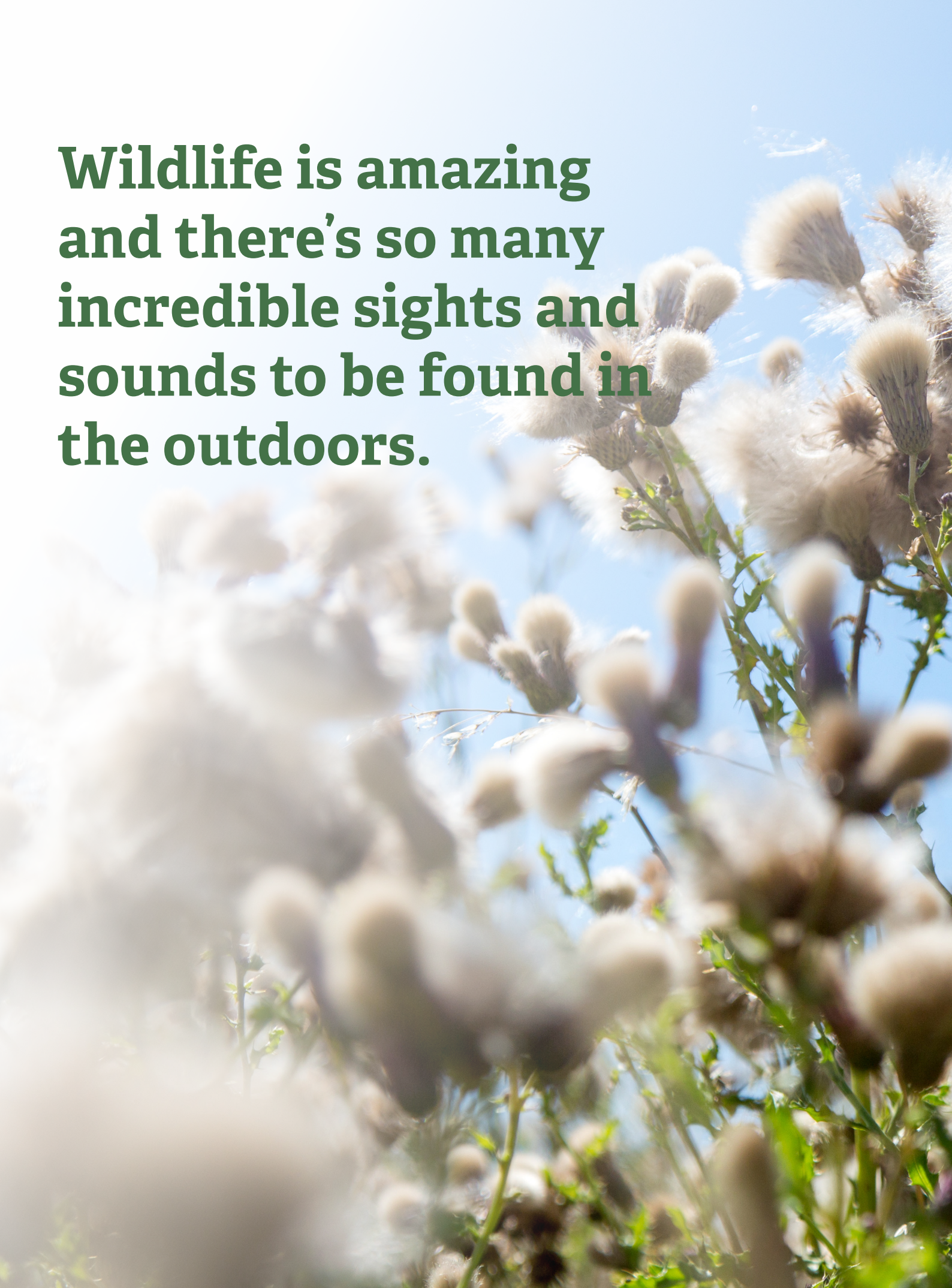
Wild about nature!

Make a wildlife pond


You will need

- A big patch of garden


- Spade 

- A plank of wood 


- Spirit level 

- Butyl pond liner 

- Sand 

- Water (use rainwater for best results) 

- A variety of pond plants 

- Large rocks 

Remember: don't add fish or a pump. The fish will eat smaller life forms (including frog and newt larvae) while the pump may suck them up!

- 1 Choose your spot.* Draw your pond outline and dig out, including some shallow areas.



Use a plank and spirit level to ensure that the edges are level.

- 2 Put a layer of sand at the bottom (don't use it all, you'll need some later).



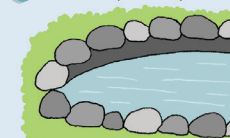
- 3 Make a trench all around the edge of your pond, and lay the edge of the liner into this. Weigh it down with large rocks.



- 4 Fill the bottom with the remaining sand.



- 5 Fill the pond up with water.



If you fill it from a tap or hose your water might turn green - don't worry, this is just the minerals.

- 6 Leave your pond to settle for about a week before adding your plants.



- 7 Watch and see what wildlife visits.

Make sure you add a plank of wood, or something similar, as a ramp to help any wildlife that may have fallen in.



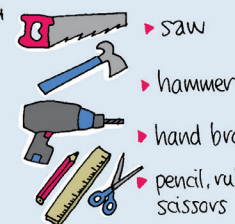
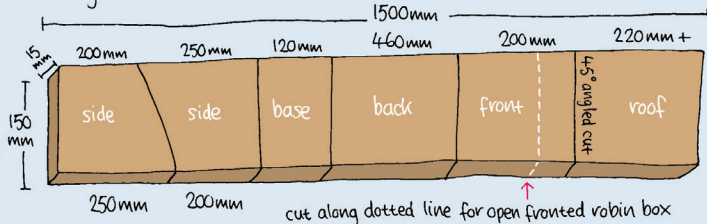
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* Look for a spot with plenty of sun, ideally with some shade in the afternoon. Try to avoid trees nearby, as fallen leaves can pollute the pond.

How to make a nest box

What you need:

- rough cut timber
- some old rubber or a hinge
- 20mm nails
- tools:



always get an adult to help with tools!

- 1 Mark out and saw panels

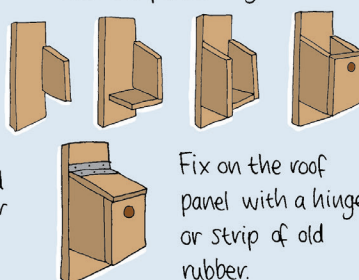
Use diagram above, and write the name of each panel onto the marked out wood.

- 2 Choose your box type



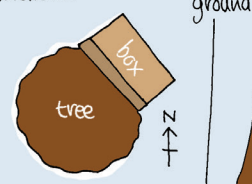
- 3 Assemble the box

Nail the panels together:



Where to put it:

2-5 metres above the ground, somewhere sheltered.

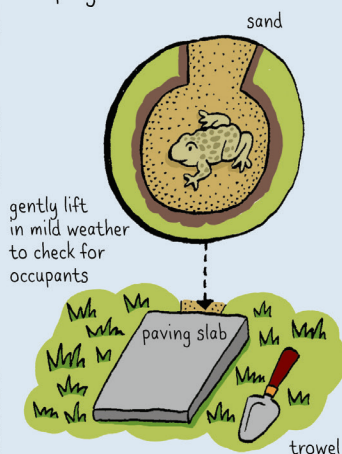


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How to build hidey holes

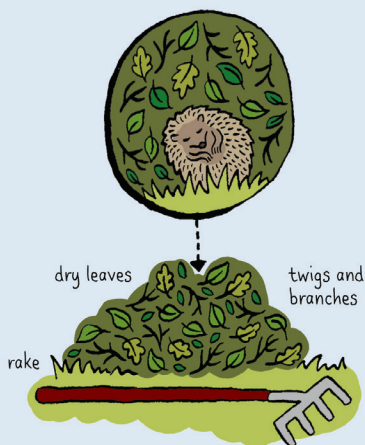
For amphibians

In a damp, cool area of the garden, dig a shallow bowl in the ground and line with sand. Cover with a slab, leaving enough room for an upward sloping tunnel.



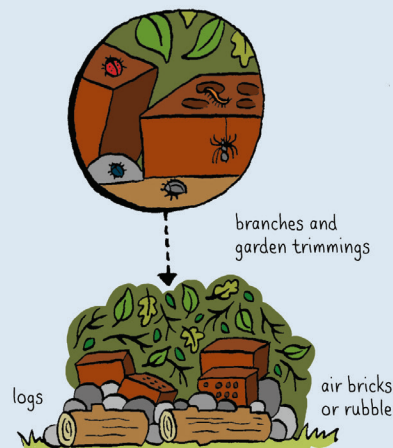
For hedgehogs

Rake a pile of dry leaves in a quiet, unused corner of the garden (under a bush is best). Build a mesh of twigs and branches around the pile, and leave an entrance space at the bottom.



For minibeasts

Stack up a log pile as the bottom layer and cover with rubble or bricks (air bricks have ready made hidey holes!) Cover the pile with branches and garden cuttings.



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How to make a mini nature reserve

1 Choose your site

Choose a safe place to put your window box – somewhere like an old bench or wall at an easy height for inspection.

2 Gather your materials

- window box
- a small log
- yoghurt pot
- some compost
- a rock

3 Fill the box with compost

Always use peat-free compost and save our precious peat bogs.

4 Add a few features

Dig in the yoghurt pot and add the small log and rock.

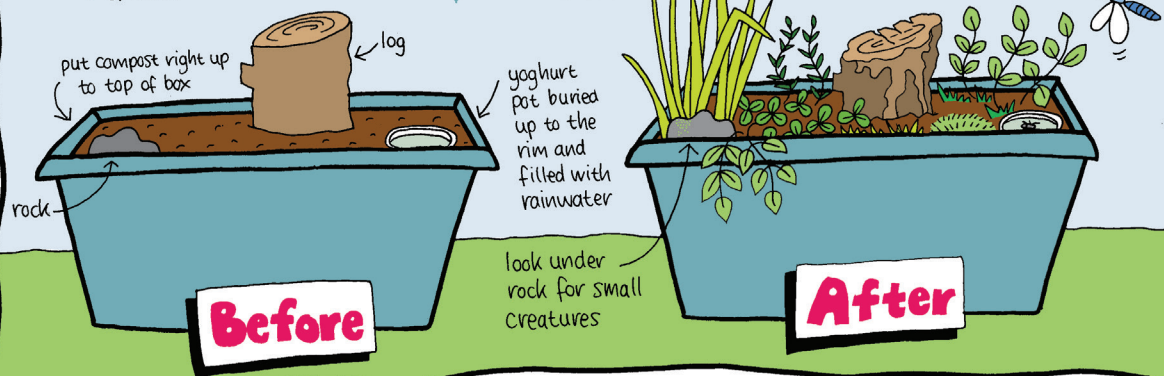
5 Leave!

6 Keep a diary

Record the changes you see. Make notes using guidebooks and take a photo every week.

7 Management

Remove out of control plants or cut them back with scissors.

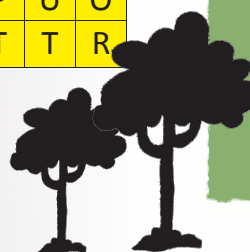

Make a butterfly painting

You will need

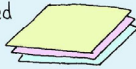
- Water-based paints



- Brushes



- Pastel coloured sugar paper



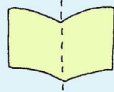
- Marker pen



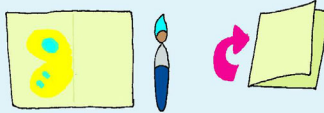
- Plenty of newspaper (to cover tables!)



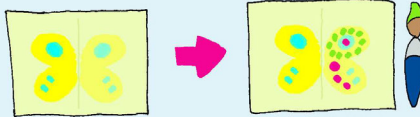
- 1 Fold a piece of sugar paper in half, side to side, and open it out.



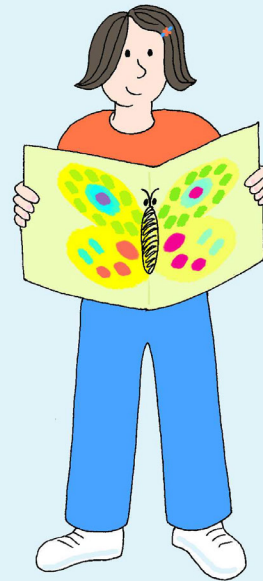
- 2 Paint the shape of butterfly wings on one half. Fold the paper over again and press it down.



- 3 Open out the paper and add more colours to one side. Refold and press.



- 4 When the butterfly wings are dry, add a body and antennae with a marker pen.



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Make your own salt dough

You will need:

- 2 cups of plain flour



- 1 cup of salt



- 1 cup of water



- shaping tools



forks

pencils

- baking tray lined with parchment

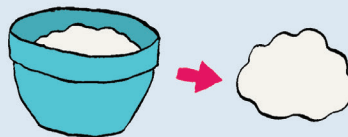


- oven or airing cupboard

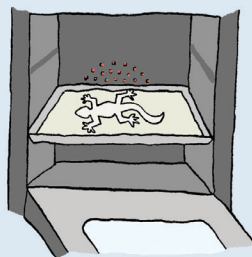
- acrylic paint, varnish and brushes (optional)



- 1 Mix the flour, salt and water together until you have a dough that sticks together.



- 3 Place your creature on a tray in an oven on a low heat until the dough is hard.



You could also use an airing cupboard or even a sunny window ledge.

- 2 Use your hands to mould the dough into the shape of an animal. Use any tools you have to add finer detail.



- 4 When the dough has cooled, paint it and add a final layer of varnish.



Varnish stops the dough from going soft.

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Make a musical rain stick

You will need

- Old cardboard tube (the thicker the better)



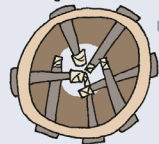
- Marker pen
- Nails or similar
- Masking tape
- Cardboard
- Scissors
- Dried beans or rice
- Hammer
- Crayons, markers or paint



- 1 Draw dots 2cm apart along the length of the cardboard tube. They don't have to be in a straight line - a spiral pattern works well.

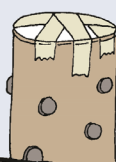
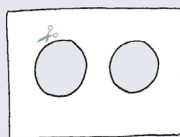


- 2 Hammer a nail into the tube at each mark (don't let the nails poke out through the other side).



Wrap a long piece of masking tape over the nail heads so they don't injure little hands or get pulled out!

- 3 If your tube doesn't have any plastic lids, make your own by drawing round the end of the tube (twice) onto card and cutting out. Seal a lid at one end of the tube with some masking tape.



- 4 Pour a handful of dried beans or rice into the tube, then secure the open end with a lid and tape.



- 5 Decorate the outside of the tube - you may want to draw on your favourite wildlife and flowers or you may have a theme - it is completely up to you!



- 6 When you have finished decorating it, gently tip the tube upside down and listen to the rain!



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Make an egg carton crab

You will need

- One section of egg box (already cut out)



- Four pipe cleaners (orange is a great crab colour!)



- Two googly eyes



- Paints and brushes



- Double sided sticky tape



- Scissors



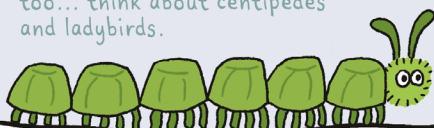
- Pencil



- Felt pen



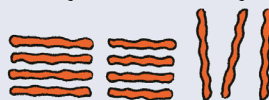
You can make other creatures too... think about centipedes and ladybirds.



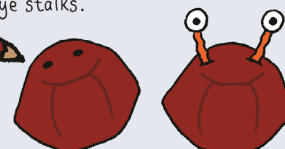
- 1 Paint the egg box section inside and out to make the crab's body. Leave to dry for a few minutes.



- 2 Cut eight pipe cleaner legs (all the same length) plus three longer pieces.



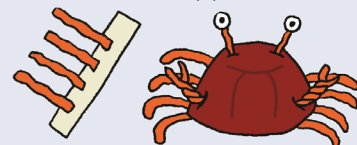
- 3 Make two holes for eye stalks with a pencil, and poke one long pipe cleaner through to make two eye stalks. Stick the googly eyes onto the tips of the eye stalks.



- 4 Twist the other two long pipe cleaners together, make two holes in the front of the body and poke the twisted pipe cleaner through to make claws.



- 5 Stick four leg pipe cleaners onto double sided tape and then stick them under the body to poke out. Repeat on the other side with the other four pipe cleaners.



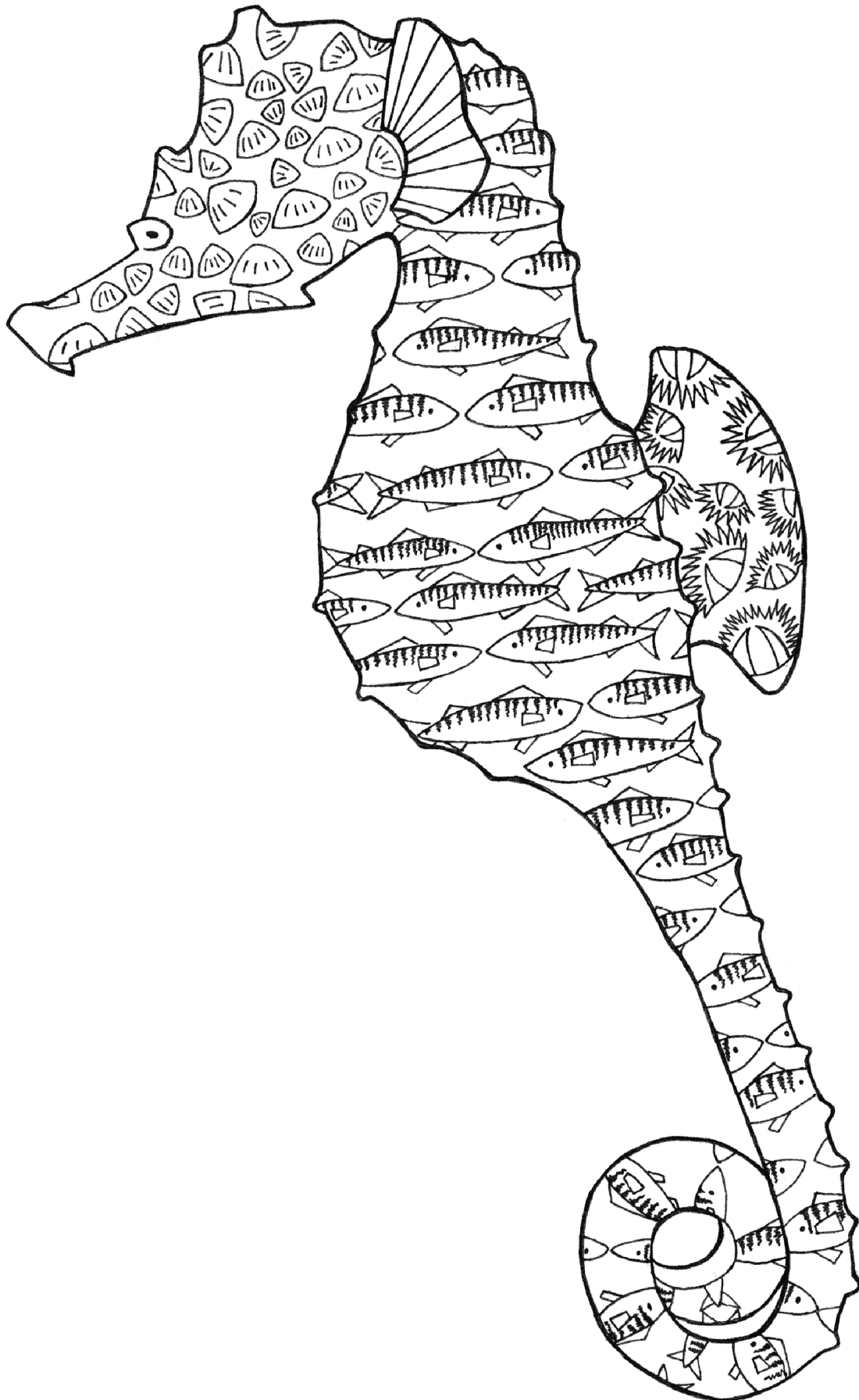
- 6 Draw on a smiley mouth!



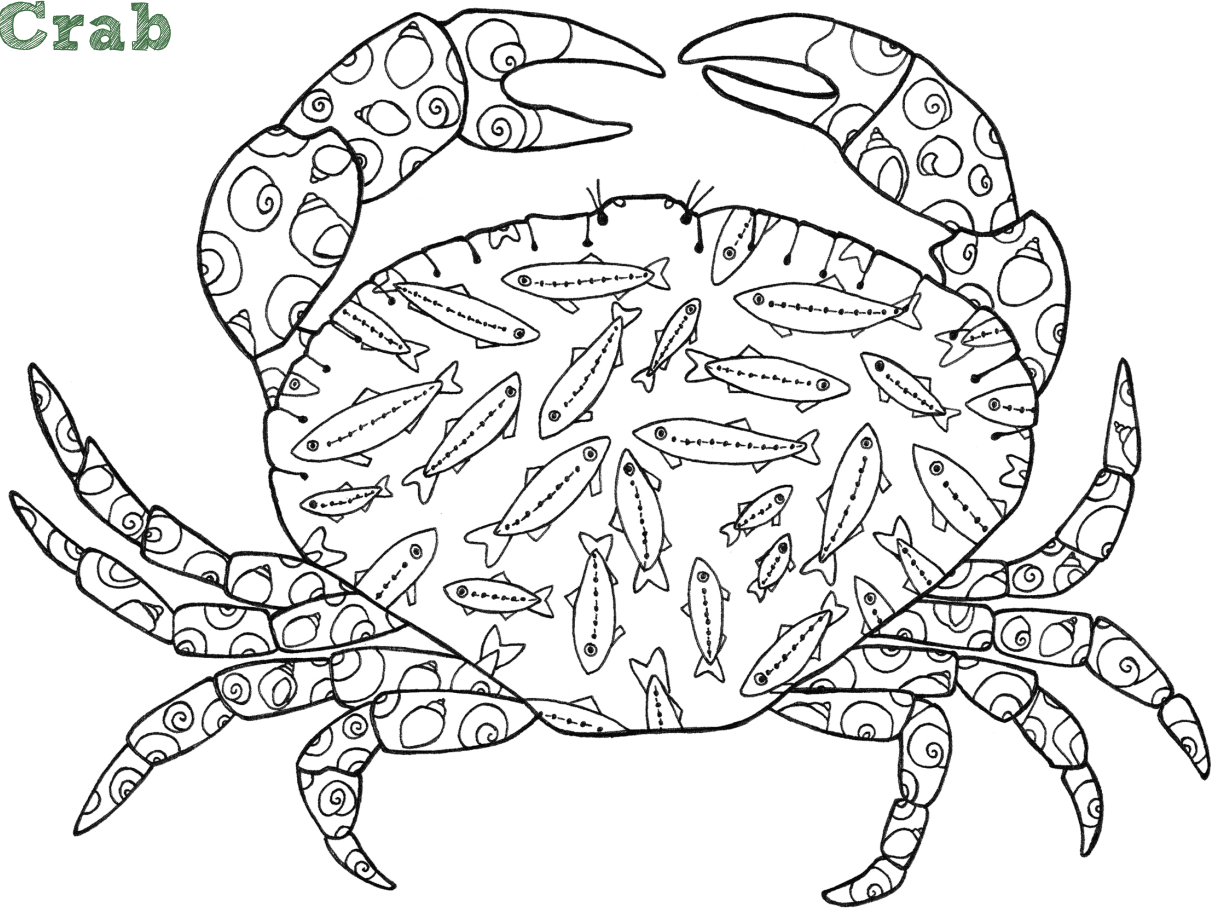

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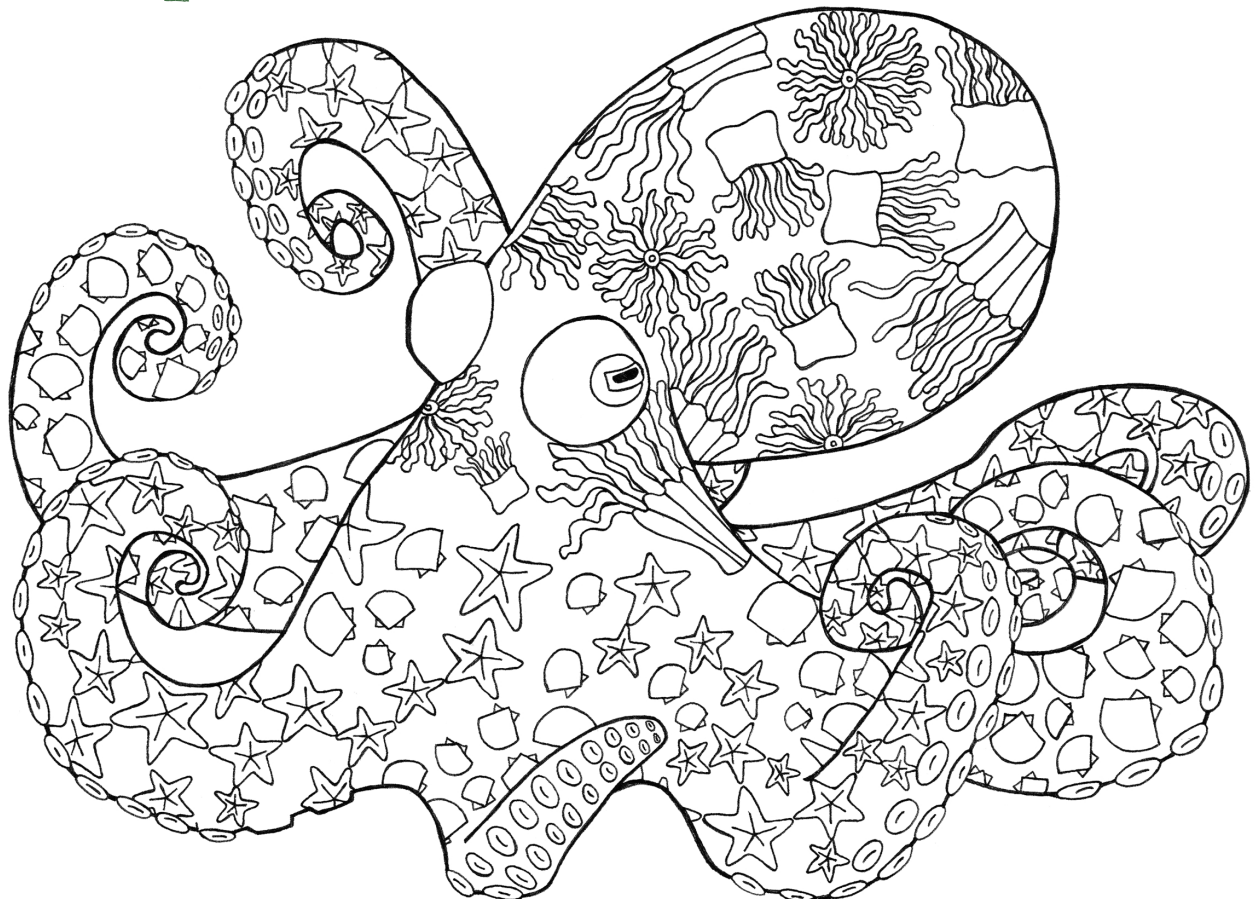

Get creative without buying anything new! Upcycling unwanted materials and natural items is an easy and environmentally friendly way to have fun.

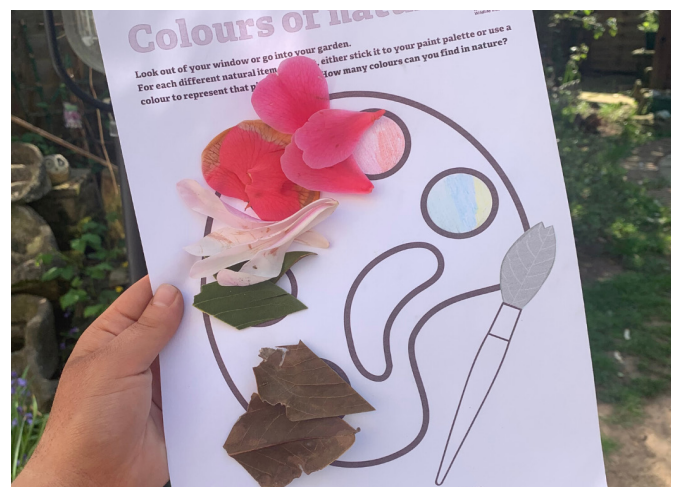
Make a recycled rainbow:

This activity is great for enhancing colour matching and sorting skills. Cut up old magazines, leaflets and clothing of different colours to make a rainbow collage. All you'll need is scissors, glue, unwanted materials and an adult to help.



Colours of nature activity:

This activity focuses on engaging with the natural items we see to create an art palette. Download our template or draw out a paint palette. Look out of your window or go into your garden. For each different natural item you spot, either stick it to your paint palette or use a colour to represent that piece of nature.
